Beyond Violence: Drought and Migration in Central America's Northern Triangle



Starting in 2014, the number of migrants from Central America's Northern Triangle— Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras—surged, with border apprehensions increasing fivefold from 2010-2015. While apprehensions have declined from their peak, emigration from these countries has not necessarily slowed, and the conditions the migrants are seeking to escape have not changed. Experts blame the region's <u>widespread criminal</u> <u>violence</u> for spurring migration. But the Northern Triangle countries also share similar ecology, staple crops, and vulnerability to climate events. While environmental and natural resource factors are just part of the complex picture, understanding how they <u>intersect with other migration drivers</u> is **keytonophanting** and implementing effective policy responses.

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
